

#### Interestingly Shocking Motorcycle Facts

- 1. The first-ever Harley Davidson motorcycle only went 40km/h. It had a single-cylinder engine that actually used a tomato can as its carburetor.
- 2. The world's most expensive motorcycle costs \$360,000! It's the *Feline One*, created by Feline Motorcycles. Some of the materials used to create it are titanium, carbon, and aerospace aluminum.
- 3. Motorcycles are extremely fuel-efficient. Although we all know they are more fuel -efficient than cars or trucks, did you know the Verucci Nitro 50 can go 172 km on one gallon of gas?
- 4. The <u>use of a helmet</u> was authorized following Colonel T.E. Lawrence's death. He was killed in a motorcycle accident after he <u>swerved to avoid</u> two young boys riding on their bicycles.
- 5. Motorcycles have been around since the 1800s! Edward Butler designed and created the world's first motorcycle in 1884. It wasn't nearly as powerful and exciting as motorcycles are today, but it created the industry we are all so invested in now.
- 6. The longest distance ever ridden on a motorcycle in 24 hours was 3256.5 km. Matthew McKelvey set this Guinness World Record in 2014 while riding in South Africa.
- 7. Horses were used as a method of transportation for messengers during World War 1 but were soon overtaken by the use of motorcycles.



#### The Birth of Motorcycles

The motorcycle, as we know it today, has its roots in the late 19th century. In **1885**, **German inventors Gottlieb Daimler and Wilhelm Maybach** developed the world's first gasoline-powered motorcycle. Known as the "Reitwagen," this revolutionary machine featured a wooden frame, a single-cylinder engine, and a top speed of about 11 miles per hour. The Reitwagen laid the foundation for future motorcycle designs and paved the way for the development of the modern motorcycle industry.

#### **The Fastest Production Motorcycle**

Also, the best seats are designed to fit your body smartly. At Wild Ass, you'll find seats that are tapered and contoured to the body, reducing pressure on the tailbone and scrotum while improving leg passage.

Don't spend another moment contemplating the necessity of these objects.

From an ergonomic seat to an all-weather jacket, from prior planning to a comfortable (and functional) helmet, these items are the bare minimum to an enjoyable, long-distance motorcycle trip. Bonus: they're wonderful for short-distance trips, too!

Honda produces several 50cc models world wide, in North America we are probably more familiae with the "mini-bike" style of the Monkey., introduced over 50 years ago.

This single cylinder with three speed transmission and automatic clutch, like the famous Super Cub, The origins of the Monkey are quite colorful. Back in the 60's a small amusement park in Tokyo, Japan wanted to offer small motorcycle rides for both children and adults. It was a big hit and Honda decided to market them commercially. The Monkey part you ask? The first Z50's were small machines, with a full sized adult onboard, the rider sat with folded knees, bent elbows and hunched posture—like a monkey. But, it didn't take long before the adjustments and accessories started to come out of the woodwork. Folding handlebars and a seat adjustable for height, headlights and taillights were soon added.

The Honda Grom and the Monkey are similar and both are quite popular. Some of the original Z50's are still running today, proving that quality built bikes are still obtainable.

Even though small, ride safe and wear a helmet to protect your coconut.

#### 09/2024 TRAFFIC STOPS & TICKET AVOIDANCE PART 1

#### **HOW TO AVOID GETTING PULLED OVER:**

In next month's Part 2 of this article, I'll offer tips for dealing with an encounter with a police officer; however, the best scenario is obviously to avoid getting pulled over in the first place. To begin, let's get a few things cleared up right away:

- I'm not advocating speeding here—the purpose of this article is ultimately to promote rider safety. Traveling at excessive speeds on public roads is incredibly irresponsible and could easily become deadly.
- Technically, riding at even 1 mph over the posted speed limit is speeding, and you can be ticketed for it—but there's an expected, and even "unofficially acceptable" speed that's somewhere between 5 and 15 mph over the posted limit.
- Speed is not always the cause of an accident, but often the more significant hazard is created by vehicles moving at different speeds as they travel together on the same road.

All that being said, here are some ways to help you stay safer and ticket free:

**CONSIDER USING A "SCOUT".** Keep some vehicles ahead of you, and if they start slowing down—maybe you should too. Look for brake lights as far ahead as possible—there could either be a hazard or a speed trap down the road; and if you spot a big rig slowing down for no apparent reason, the driver may have heard something over his CB radio indicating he should do that.

When Moses sent them off to scout out Canaan, he said, "Go up through the Negev and then into the hill country. Look the land over, see what it is like. (Numbers 13:17)

**BE A TRAFFIC "INSIDER".** If traffic is moving faster than the speed limit (and when isn't it?!), try to stay within a similarly paced group—most likely, the first or the last vehicle in the group will be the ones that are pulled over.

**IS IGNORING THE SPEED LIMIT ILLEGAL?** Yup, but with no other traffic around, try to stay closer to the posted limit—too much over, and the local police will almost certainly want to get better acquainted with you. Conversely, if you're the conservative rider who's always traveling exactly at, or below, the posted limit, law enforcement can interpret that behavior as a red flag, or even a hazard, knowledge..."

WHERE THERE'S SMOKE, THERE MIGHT BE FIRE. Sometimes there are multiple speed traps on the same road, so if someone tries to run, they'll be stopped by another patrol car right down the road. So, if you pass a police officer who already has a customer, stay alert—there might be another one somewhere up ahead.

**KEEP YOUR BIKE LEGAL.** Improperly mounted license plates, excessively loud exhausts, inadequate or illegal lights, etc., etc... will give the police excuses to pull you over. More unwanted attention....

**GET OUT OF TOWN.** If you're itching for a spirited ride, head up to the mountains and find some good switchbacks and twisties! Hopefully there won't be as much traffic, and the speed limits won't change as often, which makes it easier to keep track of and comply with them.

**WAY TO GO RICKY RACER,** somehow you got yourself squeezed by the man anyway. So, now that you've got the pretty blue lights in your mirrors, and you're the main attraction for all the rubber-neckers passing by, you're reduced to trying to cut your losses. So, what do you do now?!


